He is currently living in Yangshuo County in Guangxi Province, an area well known to tourists for its "karst peak" landscape. It is also well known within China as a place to study English, having over twenty different English schools. He is teaching afternoons at Omega College and spends mornings studying Chinese language. David enjoys getting to know his English speaking Chinese students and sharing cooking, dining and recreational activities with them. While he misses Oakland, his long range plan is to stay in China.

Board of Trustees

Pardee Home Museum Board of Trustees welcomes four new members: Kay Cheatham, Katy Foulkes, Russell Nelson and Paul Silberstein.

KAY CHEATHAM: Kay was brought up in Minnesota. After graduating from the U of Minnesota she taught high school in Japan. On her return she received a M.A. in Child Development and a Spec. in Ed. degree in School Psychology. She moved to San Francisco in 1966 and was immediately hired by the Oakland School District as a School Psychologist. She and her husband Bob soon moved to Piedmont where Kay has been a community volunteer, including a member of the Piedmont Board of Education and history docent at the Oakland Museum. Kay also worked for East Bay Education Services and the Emeryville School District. She is the mother of three. When she first visited the Pardee Home Museum years ago for a tour and tea by David Nicolai she knew that she was in a special place. She fondly remembers a piano concert in the music room and a play in the carriage house.

KATY FOULKES: Katy is a fifth generation Californian from both sides of her family. U.C. Berkeley is her alma mater as it was for her grandmother (class of 1900) parents and six siblings. She majored in English. Katy and her husband Dave have three children. Contributing to the community has long been a focus in Katy's life. She served two terms on the Piedmont City Council, including one as mayor. Since 1994 Katy has been continuously elected to the East Bay Municipal Utility District Board of Directors. Presently she is co-chair of the Bay Area Water Forum, and chair Alameda County LAFCO. In January she will serve as vice chair of Region 5 of the Association of California Water Agencies. Katy serves on numerous boards and committees, mostly related to California Water.

The Pardee Home Museum Board of Trustees is happy to have Katy join the board to continue the long relationship between EBMUD and the Pardees. George Pardee was instrumental in starting the water district in 1924 and was the first President of the Board and served until 1941.

RUSSELL NELSON: Russ first came to the Pardee Home for a guided tour in 2007 and was very impressed by how different the tour was from other historic house museums in that all the original furnishings and artifacts were

still in the home. He could easily imagine the Pardees still living in the house, and quickly became a museum member. Likewise, when Russ first moved to Oakland in 2001, he immediately took an interest in the city's history and joined the Oakland Heritage Alliance. Russ, a native of San Bernardino, California, holds a B.S. from UC-Riverside and a M.S. from Stanford. He works in the Quality department at Genentech in South San Francisco.

PAUL SILBERSTEIN: Paul was born in New York but raised in Southern California from an early age. He is a graduate of UC-Riverside and recently retired after teaching special education for many years in Oakland and Moraga. Paul attends graduate seminars at UC-Berkeley for pleasure. He first came to the Pardee Home while enrolled in a seminar on historic preservation, and he completed his final project for this seminar on the gardens restoration at the Pardee Home. After many visits to walk around the grounds, research the files on the restoration and discuss the project with David Nicolai, museum director, he fell in love with the place! Paul helped to supervise our volunteers from Clausen House and is presently overseeing the painting of the water tower. The gardens look beautiful, with the help of Paul and the caretaker Jose Rivera. Stop by for a walk through the garden.

Thanks and Appreciation

The **Gerstacker Foundation** has given generously over the years.

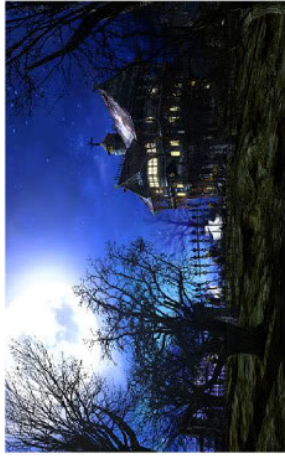
