

The Myth of Pick-Handle Pardee on April 3, 1894, but only to get

The United States faced a great depression during the time Dr. George Pardee was Mayor of Oakland (March 1883 – March 1885). Unemployment was as high as 18%. An army of jobless workers from the eastern part of the country, formed under its leader Jacob Coxey, marched to Washington DC to protest their unemployment and to encourage Congress to create Public Works jobs. The marchers were known as Coxey's Army.

The western section of Coxey's Army was known as Kelly's Army, named after its organizer, General Charles Kelly. It consisted of over one-thousand unemployed men whose goal was to march from San Francisco to Washington DC to join the unemployment protest. The group sought funding from then San Francisco Mayor C.R. Elliot who assisted 600 of them

on April 3, 1894, but only to get them as far as Oakland by ferry boat.

Mayor Pardee was infuriated and responded with the statement, "Oakland already has tramps". He then assembled a group who met at the hardware store of Frank K. Mott and were reportedly issued ax handles to assist in escorting the army from Oakland. Although Mayor Pardee denied this, there are many historical reports of this occurring.

Frank Mott became a close friend of Mayor Pardee and served on his City Council and continued in this position until 1905 when he was elected Mayor of Oakland. There will be more on Mayor Mott in future issues of the Cupola.

Recently, in the depths of a closet in the Curio Room of the Pardee Home, a single wooden wheel spoke was found that had been carefully wrapped in paper. No ax handle has ever been found at the Pardee Home. In 1894 Mott's Hardware Store would be just as likely to sell wooden wheel spokes as they were to sell ax handles. At that time there were no automobiles, but there were many carriages that required spokes for their wheels.

Perhaps his nickname really should have been "Spoke-Handle Pardee" which does not sound nearly as good as "Pick-Handle Pardee".

4th Annual Delilah Beasley Tea

On Sunday, September 27th, Progressive Oakland Women for Empowering Reform (POWER) will hold their 4th annual Delilah Beasley tea in the Pardee Home gardens from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

The annual tea is celebrated in memory of Delilah Beasley (1871-1934), a former newspaper columnist for the Oakland Tribune and the first African American woman to be published regularly in a major metropolitan newspaper. As a historian, Ms. Beasley's works remain among the critical sources for both black California and African American women's history to this day. The tea affords POWER and the community the opportunity to honor and celebrate extraordinary Oakland citizens and institutions whose vision and leadership inspire, enrich, transform and empower our communities.

This year's honoree is Arabella Martinez, Ms. Martinez has over 40 years of experience in developing strong community directed institutions that support the economic self-sufficiency and empowerment of women and communities of color. Recently retired as Chief Executive Officer of The Unity Council in Oakland, she leaves as her legacy a \$100 million national model of sustainable neighborhood revitalization linking land-use, transportation and community development that is considered exemplary.

In 1969 she was appointed as the first executive director of the

Spanish Speaking Unity Council. In those early years she created its initial economic development base of business, education and employment. In 1977 she was appointed Assistant Secretary for the Office of Human Development by President Jimmy Carter, the first Latina appointed to a sub-cabinet level position in the history of the nation.

Her legacy is an amazing story of social empowerment for Latinos and women in Northern California.

The POWER tea has become known for a beautifully presented affair, with delicious sweets, pastries, savory finger sandwiches and an array of fine teas and coffee. Live music will be offered. Local community leaders and other attendees will enjoy the lovely gardens of the Pardee Home Museum.
